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What is HSP?

HSP is a condition that is caused by inflammation of small blood vessels, producing a rash on the skin. It also commonly affects blood vessels in the kidneys, intestine and joints.

What causes HSP?

It is not known why the blood vessels get inflamed, but it may be triggered by a recent viral or bacterial infection.

How common is it?

Between 8 and 20 in 100,000 people will develop HSP in a year. The most common age group is 2-10 years old. It affects boys more than girls.

What are the symptoms?

Skin	Purple-red rash, which does not turn white when pressed. Very occasionally, the rash can turn into ulcers. Rash is usually over the back of limbs, usually in the legs.	
Abdomen	Abdominal pain can be severe. Occasionally blood is visible in stools (poo).	
Joints	Painful and swollen joints, usually in the knees and ankles	
Kidneys	Protein and blood may be found in the urine	

How is it diagnosed?

It is diagnosed by taking your child's history of symptoms and through physical examination. Urine tests will be required, and possibly blood tests. If there is high blood pressure, a lot of blood and protein in the urine, or other blood test results suggestive of kidney damage, a referral to the kidney service may be required. However, this is rarely needed.

What is the treatment?

There is no specific treatment. The symptoms usually settle on their own within 4 to 6 weeks. Your doctor will perform a full assessment and your child may be admitted to a ward if needed.

Paracetamol can be used for joint and abdominal pain relief. Ibuprofen can be used if your doctor confirms that your child's kidneys are not affected. These can be purchased over the counter and given in child doses. Steroids may be used in severe cases.

You and your doctor will need to monitor your child's urine and blood pressure over the next 6 months. Your doctor will inform you if further monitoring is required and will update your child's GP with each review.
