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What is conjunctivitis?

This is an inflammation of the clear transparent membrane covering the white part of the eye – the conjunctiva.

What causes conjunctivitis?

There are five main causes:

- Bacterial
- Viral
- Atopic (This includes seasonal hayfever)
- Chlamydia infection
- Allergy e.g. to drops or makeup

What are the symptoms?

Sore, itchy red eyes with either a sticky or watery discharge (dependent on cause). Eyelids may be stuck together in the morning.

What is the treatment?

This will vary depending on the causes. You will probably already have had at least one course of eye drops or ointment before being referred to the eye clinic.

You may have some eye swabs taken to determine the type of conjunctivitis. A special type of cotton bud will be rubbed along the inner surface of the eyelid. Some of the results will be available within a few days; others can take a few weeks. We will contact you if we need to change your treatment.

Bacterial conjunctivitis usually clears up quickly with antibiotics.

A viral conjunctivitis often associated with cough, colds or sore throat can take several weeks to clear and there is no treatment – like the common cold.

The doctor may prescribe artificial tears, which will make the eye more comfortable and or antibiotic ointment to prevent a secondary bacterial infection.

Very occasionally steroids may be prescribed to reduce symptoms. This will require review in the eye clinic while you are taking them to monitor for side effects.

Those with atopic conjunctivitis may be given eyedrops to make the eye more comfortable. Occasionally steroids are used in the short term and will require you to come in for monitoring of any side effects.

If you have allergic conjunctivitis the management will depend on any identified cause.

If you are found to have a chlamydial form of conjunctivitis then you may need to be referred to the genitourinary clinic. It is very important that you attend for treatment, as there is a high probability that you will also have a genital infection with chlamydia. This can be transmitted to others during sexual intercourse and in women, can lead to pelvic inflammatory disease, which can lead to sterility and ectopic pregnancy.

Is Conjunctivitis infectious?

Unless due to allergy yes. So it is advisable to carry out the following:

- Wash your hands thoroughly after touching your eyes, especially before and after putting your drops or ointment in.
- Use tissues if you need to wipe your eyes and dispose of this immediately.
- Do not share face flannels or face towels with others.
- Do not share or lend others your make up.
- Do not wear your contact lenses until you feel better.
