#### Introduction

We have produced this leaflet to give you general information about your procedure and we hope it will answer most of your questions.

It is not intended to replace the discussion between you and your health care professional but may act as a starting point for discussion.

# What is 3D Micro-pigmentation?

Nipple/areola micro-pigmentation is a medical tattoo, where semi-permanent pigment (colour) is implanted into the skin of your reconstructed breast to re-create a colour and shape of the nipple/areola. The aim of the procedure is to create an areola that is as realistic as possible, although it will not match exactly your other nipple/areola.

The pigment is applied using a pen-like device loaded with a sterile cartridge (containing needles). The needles move up and down at a rapid rate to penetrate the outer and inner layers of the skin. This introduces the pigment to the skin. The pigments used are iron based and are pharmaceutically tested.

Initially the colour when first applied to the skin will appear darker. You should expect it to fade or lighten up by almost a half (40%) in the following weeks. The colours used will be documented in your notes for future reference to help with colour selection for subsequent procedures.

# Are there any risks or complications?

Some of the risks or complications are listed below:

- Allergy to pigments a patch test must be completed prior to your appointment.
- Infection: this is extremely rare.
- Uneven pigment over the area: for example, if you have excessive scarring the pigment will appear differently on scar tissue. This is because the scar tissue does not take up as much pigment as normal skin.

Although these complications are possible, please remember that they are all rare.

You must let us know if you may be pregnant: Although the iron-based pigment is safe for you, we do not know if there are side effects for unborn babies.

# How do I prepare for the procedure?

Most people do not have sensation in their reconstructed breast; however, some do experience a vibration within the reconstructed breast, arm, back or armpit (axilla) during the procedure.

Traditional tattoo artists in the high street do not use anaesthetic cream, however, if you feel your reconstruction is sensitive then please use local anaesthetic cream and a protective dressing from your local pharmacy before the procedure. The whole tube of cream should be applied to the central area of the reconstructed breast (the cream should be applied in a blob; do not rub into the skin, and the dressing placed over the cream). This should be applied about three hours before your appointment and will help reduce any discomfort during the procedure.

You will be provided with a patch test with your appointment letter. Please follow the instructions provided to carry out the patch test at home, at least 48 hours before your appointment. The procedure cannot go ahead without a prior patch test.

Upon arrival for your appointment, you will be called into a clinic room where the practitioner; trained in micropigmentation, will carry out the procedure.

You will be asked to sign a consent form (micropigmentation to the nipple/areola). Additional consent forms will be required for photography (if applicable).

We encourage you to be actively involved in your session, therefore you will be asked to stand in front of a mirror with the practitioner to assist with the positioning, shape and colour to be used during the procedure.

All equipment used is sterile and disposable needles are used for each individual procedure.

A cotton pad/gauze will be applied which can be removed the next day. We will also use a spray and ointment after the procedure to help soothe the skin and to promote healing.

#### Please avoid:

- Picking or scratching the area
- Exercise/sweating
- Sun exposure
- Swimming pools and hot tubs

# What happens after my procedure?

You will be able to drive yourself home and be able to resume normal activities immediately after the procedure.

The use of perfumed creams, excessive exercise, swimming, a hot tub and exposure to the sun on the treated area should be avoided until the area is completely healed (approximately seven to 10 days).

When showering, please avoid shower gels and powerful water jets onto the treated area.

Do not pick off any dry skin or scabs which have formed over the treated area, as this will remove the pigment. The skin may peel. You may experience some slight swelling or redness to the skin around the areola. This should subside within a week.

**Please note**: if you have an MRI scan in future, you must let the radiologist looking after you know that you have "iron oxide micropigmentation". These scans work by magnets and as iron is magnetic, you may have a slight tingling sensation during your scan in the treated area.
