


Sam's visit for a 'Brainwave' test



The doctor at the hospital has asked for you to have a test called an 'EEG', which is a brainwave test!

I can tell you what happened to me during the test so that you won't be frightened.



When me and mummy arrived at the hospital we sat in a waiting room where there were lots of toys to play with. Then a friendly person called Lucy called my name and mummy and me went into another room.

The room had a computer in it with lots of coloured wires and a video camera that took pictures of me.

In the middle of the room, there was a chair that went up and down. I sat in the chair on my own with mummy near me, but I could have sat on mummy's knee too.



Lucy told me about the test and asked Mummy and me some questions about which hand I hold a pencil with, and how old I am. I was given some toys and books to play with as well.



My head was measured first with a tape measure and a special pencil. Then it was rubbed gently with cotton wool and small discs were put onto my head with sticky paste. It didn't hurt at all.

The disc's had long coloured wires and went into a box which was behind me.




Can you colour me in?

I was then shown a flashing light, which was really pretty.




At the end, Lucy took all the sticky discs off, and my hair was wiped clean and combed!




Can you colour me in?
