On behalf of all of us in our trust, a very heartfelt thank you.

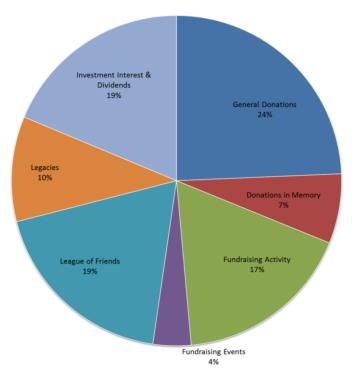

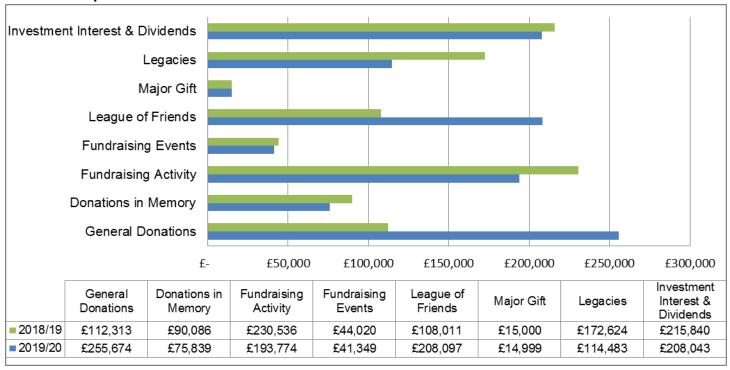
## **Our Income & Fundraising**

Total income received for the year 2019/20 was £1.11m up 13% year on year.

Income is raised from a number of different streams. General donations come from grateful patients and families for care received, or individual supporters and corporates maintaining on-going relationships with the charity. These made up 24% of income in 2019/20, up £110k vs the previous year. The Leagues of Friends donated £208k, up £100k year on year. Donations in memory of loved ones made up 7%. In memory support fell towards the end of the year with funeral restricted due to Covid-19. Supporters taking part in fundraising activities contributed 17%; these activities take place with the support of the Fundraising Team. 4% of income was generated by the events organised by the Fundraising Team. Legacies accounted for 10% of the income and are an unpredictable income source and were down 34% versus 2018/19.



Income is also received from interest on account balances and dividend payments from invested funds.

## **Fundraising Highlights**

Fundraising for the year comprises the income from General and In Memory Donations, Fundraising Activity and Fundraising Events. This totalled £567k in 2019/20, up 18.8% from £477k in year 2018/19. The increase was driven by a £143k year on year increase in General Donations which came in support of the Butterfly Appeal.

The appeal was launched in February 2019 to raise £250,000 to create a Maternity Bereavement Suite in York

We held four successful challenge events in 2019/20. We ran the Yorkshire 3 Peaks day for the second time hosting 45 walkers who raised over £10k. The York 10k was popular with 23 runners taking to the city streets to support York Teaching Hospital Charity. We had 10 Great North Runners in 2019 with those who wanted one, receiving a mention from Steve Cram on the BBC. Our Sky Dive event is becoming a more difficult ask and will be revised down from two to one date 2020/21. We had 8 sky divers, but the unpredictable weather made it less of an event with more individual dives taking place.

In December we celebrated the National Elf Service, engaging with staff, local schools and GP surgeries. Participants dressed up, held bake sales and other activities to raise money and the Fundraising Team visited with the Elfie Frame to capture the fun.

In 2019/20 we were delighted to be chosen as charity partners for Co-op Clarence Street - York, St Olave's School - York, Grand Opera House York, Marks & Spencer – McArthur Glen and Yorkshire Charity Clay Days. All of whom have specific reasons for raising money for various departments across the Trust.



The Fundraising Team have stewarded 78 third party events last year supporting donors hosting events or carrying out fundraising on our behalf. We want to reiterate our thanks to everyone who has donated and taken part in events which help to support all the different areas of our hospitals and community services.

In this financial year we have seen a 34% decrease in Legacies, down from £172k to £114k. Whilst the Fundraising Team held the 'Make a Will Week' scheme, which is offered as the main legacy toolkit to supporters, we understand Legacies are unpredictable and do vary year on year.

Alongside the appeal, fundraising activity continues to be directed towards the unrestricted funds and appropriate specific funds depending on donors' wishes. The Fundraising Team continues to provide opportunities for people to

engage with the charity and donate. They ensure that all donors receive appropriate thanks and gratitude for their donations and actively promote the charity to raise funds and awareness in a number of different ways; including:

- Organising fundraising events and taking part in larger scale challenge events organised by external companies
- Community activities and collections including our six monthly newsletter sent to our engaged supporters
- Promoting legacies through our Will Writing Scheme and 'in memory' donations
- Applying for grants from trusts and foundations
- Working with local businesses
- Effectively managing our funds and investing wisely

Fundraising record keeping and monitoring is coordinated through the Harlequin CRM system. We do not engage commercial third parties to provide a fundraising service on behalf of the charity. No fundraising complaints were received by the charity in this financial year.

## **Associated Charities**

York Teaching Hospital Charity receives income through the associated League of Friends for each hospital. These are in response to specific requests for the support of projects or equipment. The total donated by these groups in 2019/20 was £208k.

### Volunteering

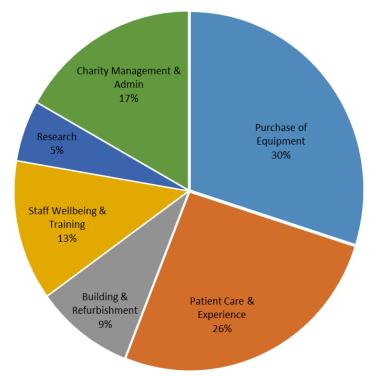
## **Our Expenditure**

Total expenditure for the year 2019/20 was £1.66m, up 66% year on year.

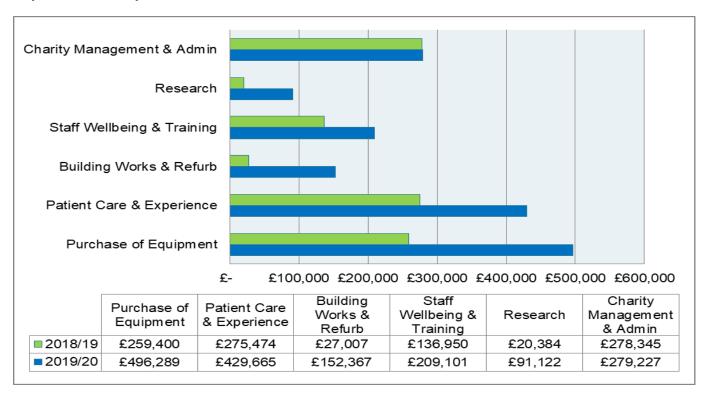
For a third year running, YTHC expenditure was higher than the income. This reflects continuing efforts across the Trust to utilise designated funds within Care Groups.

During the financial year YTHC supported a wide range of hospital and community services. The breakdown of expenditure for YTHC fluctuates from year to year in response to the changing needs and projects within the Trust and Care Groups.

With the exception of Charity Management and Administration costs which have remained static year on year, all areas of support have seen increases in spend versus 2018/19. Expenditure is ultimately for the benefit of patients to have a positive impact on their experience using our hospital and community services. In 2019/20, spend on Patient Care & Experience was £430k, £154k



more than in the previous year. £496k was spent on the purchase of equipment, up 91% year on year. We have also increased spend on Building & Refurbishment, +457% vs 2018/19 and £71k more was spent on Research than last year. £209k was spent on Staff Wellbeing & Training +53% year on year and an area which we anticipate will increase moving forwards with the effects of Covid-19.

#### Park & Ride Bus

York Teaching Hospital Charity were delighted to be able to support the Park and Ride Bus in partnership with First Bus. The new route which commenced on April 29 2019 was funded by the charity. Patients, staff and visitors alike can pick up the bus from Rawcliffe Bar, travelling through Clifton and being dropped off at the bus stop right outside the front of York Hospital. Over the year it has been great to see passenger numbers double and the service being well utilised. Feedback from staff and patients has been positive.

"The journey is roughly ten minutes! It's a convenient service, avoids unnecessary parking hassle and drops you off right outside the hospital entrance."

## Safer Transfers for Sick Patients at Scarborough Hospital

A specially equipped trolley used to transfer very sick patients from Scarborough Hospital arrived at the beginning of March. Transfers can occur for many reasons for specialist treatment such as a child to a children's hospital, burns patients being sent to Pinderfields, head trauma patients to Hull or patients with neurology or cardiac problems to dedicated centres.



Theatres team leader, Claire Jackson explains: "After initial diagnosis critically ill patients may need transferring from Scarborough to other hospitals in the region for further specialist care. The transfer team

includes an anaesthetist and an operating department practitioner or an intensive care nurse, and requires a huge amount of equipment - a transportable ventilator, syringe drivers and monitoring equipment to name just a few. We do this in a safe manner by using a specialist trolley.

"The previous trolley was over fifteen years old and with the generous help of York Teaching Hospital Charity we were able to purchase a new one which enables the safe, effective and often time critical transfer of patients when they are seriously ill."



### **Oxygen Wrist Bands**

Ward 34 at York Hospital applied to charitable funds for Oxygen Wristbands for their patients. The colour coded bands help staff to identify the patients' target saturation range; ensuring the correct level of Oxygen is prescribed. The wristbands are a simple and effective method to ensure patient safety, acting as an immediate visual prompt for staff. Staff were over the moon when they received them

#### Infographic demystifies ICU

Visitors to York hospital Intensive Care Unit (ICU) are greeted by a fantastic, super-sized infographic. It aims to help visitors and families understand the equipment that may be used in the treatment of their family or loved ones during their stay in ICU. Each piece of equipment is shown with a description as to what it does and how it helps the patient.

Consultant Rob Ferguson said "For patients and their relatives in ICU it can be the worst and most terrifying days of their loves. ICU involves a lot of invasive complex procedures and equipment which can often overwhelm visitors to the unit. I was hoping to help our visitors by demystifying some of the treatments we give in Intensive Care; I am so appreciative of the support from York Teaching Hospital Charity".





#### Radio seeds making a difference to Breast Cancer patients

In May 2019 we were very grateful to have been chosen as one of the beneficiaries of the Yorkshire Charity Clay Days. With the £38,000 received along with match funding from York Teaching Hospital Charity, we were able to purchase a Faxitron machine and radio seeds to improved breast cancer surgery for patients. Jenny Piper, Consultant Oncoplastic Breast Surgeon and Trust Lead Cancer Clinician explains:

"The seeds use radiofrequency signals, the same technology as the microchips in pets. We initially trialled 10 seeds, and were so impressed that we immediately ordered more and now the whole team are using them. The women now don't need wires inserting on the morning of surgery, and can have the seed inserted a week or more prior to their operation in much calmer circumstances. The surgery is significantly

easier with the seeds, and to date we have inserted over 30 seeds with not one patient needing to come back to theatre for further surgery. We have the Faxitron in theatre, so we can instantly take an X-ray of the breast tissue that has been removed to ensure that the cancer (and the seed) has been excised with adequate margins."

#### Radiology Duty Room

The Radiology Duty room has been fully refurbished thanks to donations received. The room is a place for the on-duty radiologist to discuss results, give advice and quickly answer questions from GPs, Doctors and Radiographers from across the Trust. The department are overjoyed with the refurbished room, which means patients will be diagnosed and treated quicker



## Governance

## **Constitution and Powers**

The charitable funds of York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust are registered under a single umbrella charity in the name York Teaching Hospital Charity (YTHC). YTHC was registered with the Charity Commission under number 1054527 on 11 April 1996. The governing document of YTHC was a declaration of trust, dated 23 February 1996, as amended by deed dated 25 May 2012. A Transfer of Staff, Property and Liabilities Order signed by authority of the Secretary of State for Health on 28 June 2012 replaced the Scarborough Healthcare NHS Trust Corporate Trustee with the York Teaching Hospital Charity Corporate Trustee. On 27 March 2013, the Corporate Trustee resolved to de-register the Scarborough charity as a charity in its own right and re-register it as a charity under the umbrella of the York Teaching Hospital Charity.

YTHC was established using the model declaration of trust and all funds held on trust on the date of registration were either part of this unrestricted fund or registered as separate restricted funds under the main charity. Subsequent donations and gifts received by YTHC that are attributable to the original funds are added to those fund balances within the existing charity.

The purpose of YTHC is to apply income for any charitable purpose relating to the National Health Service wholly or mainly for the services provided by the York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust. York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust is the Corporate Trustee of YTHC. Members of the Board of Directors are not individual trustees under Charity law but act as agents on behalf of the Corporate Trustee.

The Corporate Trustee fulfils its legal duty by ensuring that monies are spent in accordance with the designation of each fund. By designating funds, the Corporate Trustee respects the wishes of donors to benefit patient care and advance the good health and welfare of patients, carers and staff. Where monies have been received that have legal restrictions imposed, a restricted fund is established.

• Ensure best practice is followed in the conduct of all its affairs fulfilling all of its legal responsibilities.

• Ensure that the Investment Policy, approved by the Corporate Trustee is adhered to and that performance is continually reviewed whilst being aware of ethical considerations and monitor the performance of the investment managers.

• Report to the Corporate Trustee so it remains fully informed on the activity, performance and risks of the charity.

## 3. Policies and Procedures

During this year, the Charity Governance Committee has reviewed policies and documents relating to each of the items below. The policies are reviewed according to a timetable. The Corporate Trustee has delegated functions to the Charity Governance Committee but retains overall responsibility for the Charity.

## **Risk Register**

The Charity Governance Committee actively reviews the perceived major risks that the Charity faces. Operational standards have been set throughout the organisation which is audited on a regular basis.

The Charity also maintains a risk register which is reviewed annually.

## Scheme of Delegation

The Charity operates within the constraints of the scheme of delegation and standing financial instructions.

The acceptance of income (e.g. donations and legacies) and the approval of expenditure operates within an authorisation framework.

### Income

All transactions are undertaken in accordance with the Charity's scheme of delegation and standing financial instructions for funds held. This means that all items are subject to strict financial controls to safeguard and monitor monies donated.

## Expenditure

Expenditure is appropriately controlled to ensure that it fulfils the objects of the Charity and of the individual funds.

YTHC relies on York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust to identify the appropriateness of funding requests in order to keep transaction costs to a minimum and to simplify the approval process. All expenditure is approved in advance and in line with the Charity's scheme of delegation. The Charity Governance Committee approves all

significant expenditure in advance and routinely monitors all expenditure to confirm that it is appropriate. A scheme of delegation setting out limits of authority for approving expenditure is in place. All our grants and activities demonstrate public benefit, so that the Corporate Trustee has complied with its duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising its powers or duties.

## **Investment Policy**

The overall objectives of the policy are to create sufficient income and capital growth to enable the charity to carry out its purposes consistently year on year, with due and proper consideration for future needs and the maintenance and enhancement of the value of the invested funds while they are retained.

The charity has a portfolio of professionally managed investments. The Corporate Trustee precludes investment in companies closely connected with the arms trade, tobacco and alcohol industries. This is defined as companies with more than 20% of their turnover in these activities. The investment portfolio is managed on a discretionary basis by YTHC's investment managers, Brewin Dolphin. Investment income amounted to £208k for the year (2019: £216k). The total portfolio was valued at £5,902k at the end of the year (2019: £6,646k).

## **Reserves Policy**

The charity derives most of its income from donations and legacies and this varies from one year to the next. Charities are always conscious of the need to secure their viability for the longer term by putting aside some of their current income to meet future commitments and as a reserve against uncertainties. Charities also have a requirement to apply their income for the purposes for which it was given, within a reasonable timescale.

While the Corporate Trustee does not aim to retain excessive reserves, there is a need to retain some reserves, main reasons being;

- To ensure donations are spent in line with the donor's wishes.
- Donations may be made for specific purposes but will not be spent immediately if unnecessary.
- To ensure there are sufficient funds to fund future developments.
- To meet current or anticipated expenses such as management, administration and governance costs.

The Corporate Trustee calculates the reserves as that part of the unrestricted income funds that is freely available after taking account of designated funds that have already been earmarked for specific needs. At the end of March 2020 the unrestricted undesignated reserves amounted to £395k (2019: £891k). The Corporate Trustee foresees a need only to maintain reserves sufficient to provide certainty of funding for average annual general grant making. Therefore the target range for reserves is £250,000 to £750,000 to ensure the stability of grant funding.

#### STATUTORY BACKGROUND

The Trustee of the York Teaching Hospital Charity, York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, has been appointed under s11 of the NHS and Community Care Act 1990.

The York Teaching Hospital Charity is registered with the Charity Commission and includes funds in respect of York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

#### MAIN PURPOSE OF THE CHARITY

The main purpose of the York Teaching Hospital Charity is to apply income for any charitable purpose relating to the National Health Service wholly or mainly for the services provided by the York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

## Statement of Trustee's Responsibilities

The Trustee is responsible for:

- keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the funds held on trust and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with Charities Act 2011 requirements;

- establishing and monitoring a system of internal control;

- establishing arrangements for the prevention and detection of fraud and corruption;

and

safeguarding assets and ensuring their proper application under Charity law.

In accordance with the charities SORP Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011, the Trustee is required to prepare accounts for each financial year. The Charity Commission directs that these accounts give a true and fair view of the financial position of the funds held on trust. In preparing those accounts, the Trustee is required to:

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue its activities;

- apply on a consistent basis suitable accounting policies;

- make judgements and estimates which are reasonable and prudent;

and

state where the financial statements comply with the trust deed and whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts.

The Trustee confirms that it has met the responsibilities set out above and complied with the requirements for preparing the accounts on a going concern basis. The financial statements set out on pages 23 to 37 attached have been compiled from and are in accordance with, the financial records maintained by the Trustees.

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Accounting Convention / Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified for the revaluation of certain investments, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1st January 2015.

The funds held on trust accounts are prepared in accordance with the accruals concept. With an overall funds balance approaching  $\pounds$ 6m and expenditure for 2019/20 of  $\pounds$ 1.6m (and not expected to increase significantly over the next 2 years), then the charity is considered to be a going concern.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about York Teaching Hospital NHS Charity's ability to continue as a going concern. There are no material uncertainties affecting the current year's accounts.

#### 1.2 Income

a) All income including donations, activities for generating funds and investment income are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities as soon as the following three factors are met:

i)	entitlement - arises when a particular resource is receivable or the Charity's right becomes legally enforceable;
ii)	certainty - when it is probable that the income will be received;
iii)	measurement - when the monetary value of the incoming resources can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### b) Legacies

Legacies are accounted for as income once the receipt of the legacy becomes probable. This will be once confirmation has been received from the representatives of the estates that payment of the legacy will be made or property transferred and once all conditions attached to the legacy have been fulfilled.

Where the exact monetary value is not known. An assessment will be made based on known facts and potential liabilities and disbursements due from the estate, to provide a reasonable estimation of the amount due to the charity.

#### 1.3 Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party. Expenditure is apportioned on a direct cost basis across restricted, unrestricted and endowment funds and irrecoverable VAT is included in the expense to which it relates.

a) Cost of generating funds

The cost of generating funds are the costs associated with generating income for the funds held on trust. This will include the costs associated with investment managers' fees.

b) Grants payable

Grants payable are payments made to third parties (including NHS bodies) in the furtherance of the funds held on Trust's charitable objectives to relieve those who are sick. They are accounted for where the conditions for their payment have been met or where a third party has a reasonable expectation that they will receive the grant, or any condition attaching to the grant is outside the control of the Charity.

c) Governance costs

These cover legal and audit fees.

#### d) Support costs

These are recharges of appropriate proportions of staff services costs from York Teaching Hospital NHS Foundation Trust. See Note 4

#### 1.4 Fixed Assets

Fixed assets bought via the Charity are gifted to the Trust and accounted for in the Trust's accounting records. Tangible and intangible assets which are capable of being used for more than one year, and have a cost equal to or greater that £5,000 are capitalised.

1.5 Cash and cash equivalent

Cash at bank and in hand is held to meet the day to day running costs of the Charity as they fall due. Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments, held in interest bearing savings accounts.

- 1.6
   Debtors

   Debtors are amounts owed to the Charity. They are measured on the basis of their recoverable amount.
- **1.7** Creditors Creditors are amounts owed by the Charity. They are measured at the amount that the Charity expects to have to pay to settle the debt.

#### 1.8 Financial Instruments

The Charity has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

With the exception of the fixed asset investments, basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at the present value of the future cash flows unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial.

Financial assets comprise cash at bank and in hand and debtors.

Financial liabilities comprise creditors.

Fixed asset investments, including bonds and cash held as part of the investment portfolio, are reported at fair value at the balance sheet date, with gains and losses being recognised within statement of financial activities.

#### 1.9 Structure of funds

Where there is a legal restriction on the purpose to which a fund may be put, the fund is classified in the accounts as a restricted fund. Funds where the capital is held to generate income for charitable purposes and cannot itself be spent are accounted for as endowment funds. Other funds are classified as unrestricted funds. Funds which are not legally restricted but which the Trustee has chosen to earmark for set purposes are designated funds. The major funds held within these categories are disclosed on notes 9.1 to 9.6.

#### 1.10 Investment in Fixed Assets

Investment in fixed assets are shown at market value as at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses arising on any revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

- i.) Quoted stocks and share are included in the Balance Sheet at midmarket price, ex-div.
- ii.) Other investment fixed assets are included at market value as per the Charity's investment manager's valuation report.

#### 1.11 Realised gains and losses

All gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and opening market value (or date of purchase if later). Unrealised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between market value at the year end and opening market value (or date of purchase if later).
