



Information for patients, relatives and carers

Metacarpal Fracture

You have sustained a fracture of a bone in the hand. This has been confirmed by x-ray and should heal without complications. It should not be necessary for you to attend the hospital for further treatment.

Treatment

You have been supplied with strapping and a sling. In addition to this:

- You can take over the counter painkillers such as paracetamol, ibuprofen or co-codamol as recommended if you have pain
- Elevate the injured hand on pillows when resting to help reduce swelling
- You should wear the strapping full time for the first week. The sling should only be necessary for the first two to three days
- After one week you may remove the strapping for progressively longer periods to enable you to exercise your hand
- You should avoid contact sport and games for at least six weeks after the injury
- After two weeks the strapping should no longer be necessary

You can return to work or school as soon as pain allows, and you can do your normal light tasks

You should not drive until you can make a full pain free fist, can grip the steering wheel and perform an emergency stop manoeuvre without distracting pain.

You may have swelling at the site of the fracture and your knuckle may appear less prominent, but these things require no treatment and will not affect the function of your hand in the long term.
