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Your ERCP

You have had an ERCP

During your procedure the doctor has:

- ☐ Performed a small cut at the opening of bile duct
- ☐ Removed one or more stones
- ☐ Placed a stent
- ☐ Other: please state

The medication you received was:

- ☐ Midazolam
- ☐ Fentanyl
- ☐ Buscopan
- ☐ Throat spray
- ☐ Diclofenac suppository

Very rarely patients can develop severe eye pain after receiving Buscopan within the next 24 hours. If this is the case, you must seek urgent medical advice as you may have an undiagnosed condition called glaucoma.

Midazolam and Fentanyl

Midazolam is a sedative and Fentanyl is a painkiller. Both these medications can affect your concentration and co-ordination. You may feel light headed or faint. It is essential that you have someone to accompany you home and to look after you when you get home and stay overnight.

For the next 24 hours following your procedure:

- a) You must not drive, ride a bike
- b) You must not drink alcohol
- c) You must not operate any machinery
- d) You must not sign any legal binding documents
- e) You must not return to work
- f) You must not use public transport
- g) You should not be the sole responsible adult/carer for any individual

Be more aware of electrical appliances, cookers, hot saucepans etc.

Instructions following throat spray

A local anaesthetic spray has been used to numb your throat during the procedure. This will normally take 30 minutes to wear off.

What to expect

You may have some discomfort in your stomach or feel bloated. This is because air was put into your stomach during the procedure; this will soon wear off.

You may have a sore throat, which can last up to 24 hours.

Any discomfort, inflammation or swelling at the site of your cannula should settle in a few days.

If you feel well, you may eat light food four hours after your procedure and eat normally the day after.

Pain relieving tablets, such as the kind you would take for a headache, may be taken at home according to the manufacturer's instructions. Please rest for 24 hours post procedure.

What happens next?

- ☐ No further follow up is required
- ☐ A repeat procedure (will be arranged)
- ☐ An outpatient appointment will be sent to you
- ☐ You require another investigation

If you experience any of the following symptoms:

- a) Any unexpected pain (neck, chest and abdominal pain)
- b) High temperature
- c) Sweating
- d) Vomiting
- e) Any signs of bleeding
- f) Black stools
- g) Dizziness

Except in certain circumstances, stents should be removed after three to 12 months.
