


**Speech and Language Therapy Advice Sheet**

## Visual supports and changes to the environment

- •Keep routines clear and consistent Try to use visual timetables or 'Now and Next' boards so children know what is happening and what is coming next.
- •Cut down background noise to help children who find it hard to understand spoken language.
- •Use different ways to communicate, not just speech Spoken words disappear quickly, so also use gestures, signs, pictures, objects, or writing to help children understand.
- •Think about where children sit This is especially important for children who have trouble seeing or hearing. Make sure they can see the teacher and any important things in the classroom.
- •Consider children with visual impairments Too many colours or objects can make it hard for them to focus. Use strong colour contrasts like white or yellow on a black background to make things clearer.





## Language support

- •Give children extra time To think and answer when you ask them to do something. Understanding language can be hard for some children.
- •Use short, simple sentences Try not to use sayings or language that is hard to understand.
- •Use group and partner work To help children practise talking and listening with others (but this might not work for every class).
- •Think about the questions you ask Make sure they are not too hard. You can use tools like 'Blank levels of questioning' to help choose the right kind of questions.
- •Help children say when they don't understand You could use prompt cards, or something simple like a red/green paddle to show if they're okay or need help.
- •Regulation comes first Consider the sensory and emotional regulation needs of the children in the class. For example, you could start the session with a 'Zones of Regulation' check-in
