

# Y&S Nervecentre: Key eDN Changes: Important information for primary care services.

Y&S trusts will be moving to Nervecentre EPR. Nervecentre EPR generated discharge letters will look different to those currently issued.

The new Nervecentre-generated discharge letters maintain the same standard of information and continue to meet the requirements for safe transfer of care.

All other correspondence (letters to GP) will be received in the same format to now.

### When will these changes take effect?

**28/02/26**- Patients discharged from Bridlington or Scarborough hospitals.

**07/03/26**- Patients discharged from York Hospital, St Monicas, Selby Inpatient Unit, Whitecross Court, Nelsons Court.

### Key changes:

- Actions for GP including medication, nurses and AHPs are listed in 'Inpatient Outcome (Primary Care)' section.
- Resus status, Treatment Escalation Plan and if a Respect form was completed during inpatient stay will be shared.
- Specialties involved in care alongside responsible consultant can now be described in a free text format
- Identified Safeguarding or complex needs information are listed in the same section.
- Source of admission is now in the letter.
- Care Alerts for the person will now be included.

### Allergies

Allergies, Sensitivities and Reactions

Allergies/Adverse Reactions: Ibuprofen- Intolerant- Moderate-Gastro

All allergies recorded in Nervecentre will be listed in the discharge letter, existing allergies recorded in the current EPR will be transferred to Nervecentre. Nervecentre categorises the type of reaction as allergic or intolerance.

# Nervecentre eDN: Medication Changes

Medication actions for practices will be outlined and clearly visible in the body of the discharge letter.

Information on medications stopped or suspended in hospital are clearly listed in the medication section.

There are no changes in terms of quantities of medicines supplied on discharge.

When will these changes take effect?

28/02/26: Patients discharged from Bridlington or Scarborough hospitals.

07/03/26: Patients discharged from York Hospital, St Monicas, Selby Inpatient Unit, Whitecross Court, Nelsons Court.

**Duration:**

- 1.Intended last dose of course populated for fixed durations e.g., antibiotics.
- 2.A fixed supply quantity i.e., 7 days of analgesia will be indicated by a number of days.

- 1.Instructions for GP/Patient.
- 2.Prescription Start date and time for fixed course lengths.
- 3.Indication where this is mandated at the point of prescribing.

**Quantity:**

The quantity of medication dispensed by the trust or outpatient pharmacy. Where specified, this reflects the exact amount issued.

**Source:**

Indicates the source of supply at discharge. For example, 'FP10' shows that the patient was given a paper FP10 prescription on discharge to obtain their medication from a community pharmacy.
